

 - B. Suggestions for members to serve on Society Committees.
 - C. Candidates for Society Honors and Awards (Fellow, Distinguished Service, etc.).

Biographies for Items A and B should be forwarded directly to the Society Secretary. Please indicate on the forms the purpose for which they are submitted.

Biographies for Item C should be forwarded directly to the Chairman of the Honors and Awards Committee, c/o ASHRAE Headquarters, 1791 Tullie Circle, N.E., Atlanta, GA, 30329. In addition to the biographical form, a statement of recommendation, which includes details of the candidate's accomplishments should be submitted by the chapter sponsoring the candidate.

- 8. Outline of Society Honors and Regional Awards requirements.
- Worksheet.

The Chapters Regional Conference is the principal vehicle for the collection of chapters' suggestions concerning the operation and policies of the Society. You will be instructed by your chapter as to specific recommendations for CRC discussion.

A paramount duty of the CRC is to select one member and one alternate to the ASHRAE Nominating Committee. This is one of the most important of the Society's committees, with the responsibility of selecting and nominating people who will guide the affairs of the organization and conduct its operations. The welfare of the Society and the achievement of its objectives must be the committee's principal consideration. Please take note that the Bylaws specify that a member of the committee "shall have been a full member in good standing in the Society for a period of at least five years at the time of selection."

The effectiveness of a technical society is based on the active participation of its members and the functioning of its committees. Our research program, standards development, meetings papers and the technology included in the Handbooks and technical bulletins are all dependent on our 150 committees and subcommittees. Recommending members for these committee activities is a chapter's responsibility. As a delegate to the CRC, it becomes your duty to propose such names to the CRC for its consideration and further recommendation to Headquarters. To speed the regular business session, these names are frequently chosen after group discussion at a preliminary caucus, usually held the night before the meeting. Be sure to indicate the committee for which the individual is being recommended.

At the CRC meeting you are the "official representative" of your chapter and should be prepared to present your chapter's opinion on subjects discussed. Your Regional Chairman will distribute an agenda for the meeting and you should review it with your chapter officers or Board of Governors.

Guidelines for Motions and Resolutions.

ASHRAE can be meaningful if its local groups indicate needed action, whether it be in publications, standards, meetings or in the support of its chapters. You, as a chapter delegate, can insure that your chapter's requests concerning any of these areas are brought to the attention of the CRC.

Please note: It is your obligation upon returning to your home chapter to give a full report on the discussions and activities occurring at the meeting.

INSTRUCTIONS TO DELEGATE & ALTERNATE FOR CRC's

Chapters Regional Committee Meeting (Business Session)

There are three parts to the Chapters Regional Committee Meeting. The Caucus Session, the Business Session, and the Executive Session. As a delegate you will be involved in all three of these sessions.

Caucus

This is an informal session. It is usually held at the beginning of the Chapters Regional Committee Meeting and attended by only the delegates and alternates from the chapters, the regional nominating committee representative and the alternate regional nominating committee representative. The purpose is to provide a forum for the Director, Regional Chairman to instruct the caucus prior to going into the Executive Session. After the Director, Regional Chairman has presented his instructions, the Caucus Session will be turned over to the nominating committee representative for the Executive Session. During this first Executive Session the delegates and alternates should present the biographies of the candidates that will be presented for offices and/or honors and awards. Enough copies of the biographies should be available so that each person attending may have a copy.

Business Session

Each chapter shall as a minimum prepare the following in one complete binder:

- 1. A completely filled out Summary Report Form (Attachment W).
- 2. Report of Chapter Activities for the preceding year, including committee reports.
- 3. Chapter Committee Chairmen's MBO's.
- 4. A sample newsletter.
- 5. The Chapter's roster.

After the report phase of the Business Session, the Chapters are encouraged to present action items for changes in any Chapter, Regional or Society activities or policies.

All reports and action items presented at the Chapters' Regional Conference will take place at the business session, except

for those items specified for the Executive Session.

The chapter delegate is the voting member. The regional vice chairmen, the regional nominating committee representative and the alternate regional nominating committee representative attend in their official capacity. The regional chairman is chairman of the meeting. The chapter delegates report on the progress of their chapters and student branches and their recommendations concerning policy procedures and operations of Society. Motions that are passed are then brought forward to Regions Council for further consideration.

Executive Session (Closed Session)

Only the delegates and alternates from the chapters, the regional nominating committee representative, and the alternate regional nominating committee representative may attend the Executive Session. The regional nominating committee representative is the chairman. The host chapter delegate is the secretary. Chapter delegates vote to recommend members for the following:

- 1. Regional Chairman (if appropriate)
- 2. Officers and Directors-at-Large
- 3. General committees
- 4. Technical committees
- 5. Honors and awards

Report

The regional nominating committee representative will forward the report of the Executive Session to Society secretary at Headquarters within 30 days of the meeting. Members who serve on grass roots committees (regional vice chairmen) should be contacted as to their willingness to serve before their names are put in this position.

REMARKS FROM SOCIETY OFFICERS AND STAFF

a) President-Elect, Damon Gowan

Chairman Johnson introduced President-Elect Gowan. Mr. Gowan thanked the New Brunswick Chapter for hosting the CRC. He stated that he was from Region 8 in Houston, Texas and had worked his way up through the Chapter offices and into various Society Committees. He advised that he felt volunteering was the way to go. Mr. Gowan felt that he had gained a lot out of ASHRAE work. He invited any member to speak with the Society officers during their visit. A formal presentation will be made by Mr. Gowan at the Presidential Luncheon on Friday.

b) Vice-President, Richard Charles

Chairman Johnson introduced Vice-President of Society, Richard Charles from the Golden Gate Chapter in San Francisco. Mr. Charles thanked the New Brunswick Chapter and advised he was very pleased to be in this part of the country. Mr. Charles invited all those present to continue with their volunteering in ASHRAE as it is a two way street. He pointed out that ASHRAE has a lot to offer - advancing standards related the human factors to the benefit of the human public.

REGIONAL VICE-CHAIRMEN REPORTS

HISTORICAL COMMITTEE

Cliff Thompson advised it had been a quiet year. A package of instructions from Society had been sent to all Chapters and Mr. Thompson had written to all Chapters requesting the name of their Historical Chairman.

He invited all present to attend the Historical Committee meeting on Saturday.

REFRIGERATION

Refrigeration is recognized under the PAOE awards.

REGIONAL VICE Chairmen Reports continued....

MEMBERSHIP

Gerard Doyle reported that Region 2 finished tenth on June 30, 1989 in PAOE Points with 4730 Membership Points. Seven of eleven Chapters exceeded PAOE Par with Toronto in first place and La Ville de Quebec in second place.

Mr. Doyle noted that we must communicate with other Chapters and the Regional Chairman and Vice-Chairmen and Headquarters in order to make sure all points are recorded.

ENERGY AND TECHNICAL AFFAIRS

John-Guy Lahaie reported that the total for Region 2 PAOE points was 4805, an average of 437 points per Chapter, The par is 4400 which is as a total quite acceptable. But, if we compare this to the other regions, we are one of the lowest.

Every chapter needs to improve their performance in this area.

He invited all members to attend the Workshop on Saturday.

EDUCATION AND CHAPTER PROGRAM

John Bisset reported that Society is considering a reorganization of the Education and Chapter Program Committee. There is a proposal to form 2 separate committees, one responsible for educational areas and the other for programs. This will be assessed on 1990 Winter Meeting.

Communications between the chapters and the Vice-Chairman have been a problem.

The New Brunswick Chapter will receive the Darryl Boyce Trophy for 1988-89 Best Education and Chapters Program Committee.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Robert Morris reported a good cauchs had been held on Wednesday August 23, 1989. Many names had been brought forward. More time is needed.

ARC CANADA

Paul Conrad, President of this Committee invited all those present to the Annual Meeting, Friday, August 25, 1989 7:00 a.m.

He reported that last year's totals were phenomenal. The total raised this year was \$128,223.11. Thirteen out of nineteen chapters exceeded their goal.

1994 COMMITTEE

Paul Conrad reported that the sub-committee has now disbanded after submitting their report to Members Council. Members Council will discuss the recommendations and submit their recommendations to EX-Comm and then the Board will decide on plans for 1994, The Anniversary Year. Over three hundred suggestions were received by the suggestion committee.

CHAPTERS ANNUAL REPORTS

Chairman Johnson asked that the Chapters distribute their reports. Each Chapter was given five minutes to comment on their activities for the year.

HALIFAX

Harinder Singh reported that Halifax had a successful year. Financially, the chapter is in a sound position. In assessing the potential of forming a Chapter in Newfoundland, it was concluded that this would not be feasible. The Program Committee has been pursuing the table top presentation idea and it is hoped that the upcoming year will see this idea implemented.

Obtaining qualified speakers is a problem. Mr. Singh reported they are trying to use more local people or panel discussions.

NEW BRUNSWICK

Rino Levesque reported that New Brunswidk had a successful year. Their Research and Promotion surpassed their goal and became one of the 'Goal Busters'. Chapter attendance stayed the same, but attendance at the executive meetings was low. Obtaining speakers is a constant problem. This Chapter is in a sound financial position.

LAC ST. JEAN

Roger Perron reported this chapter has trouble communicating with other chapters and Vice-Chairmen. The Chapter is financially sound and has good participation from members. They would like to see a Chapter Operations Manual in French.

LA VILLE DE QUEBEC

Raynald Courtemanche reported they had a very successful year. They had very good meeting attendance because of improved technical content and good membership promotion.

Mr. Courtemanche reported improved financial position because of better management of cost of meals and a successful symposium. The Chapter has problems trying to meet the Research Promotion goals.

MONTREAL

Membership has reached a record high of three hundred and thirty three paid members. In this total eighty-three new members joined. Communications between Chapter and Headquarters have been a problem which all are working on to correct.

Montreal Chapter is looking forward to hosting the 1990 CRC.

OTTAWA VALLEY

Byron Landray reported that their year began with great excitment as being hosts for the 1988 Summer Society Meeting. A little letdown was experienced because of the tremendous support they had received from their membership during the planning and hosting of this event. They also had bad timing with a technical seminar and waited too long to increase their dues which jumped from \$90.00 to \$125.00. Even with these difficulties, the Ottawa Valley Chapter had a fine year and exceeded par in all PAOE categories.

TORONTO

Tom Kilmer reported Toronto had a good year. Research Promotion under the direction of Cliff Thompson reached \$34,425.00. Their goal had been \$20,000.00. They celebrated a JOHN FOX Night when John inducted the officers of the Toronto Chapter for the 25th year.

MISSISSAUGA

Bernard Rutledge reported his Chapter has had a mixture of success. There is great potential in Mississauga for a good chapter, but because of the building boom at present, time is not available for ASHRAE at present. There are many new buildings and sophisticated equipment and there is a need for many engineers, technologists and stationary engineers to run these facilities. Mississauga is trying hard to increase membership.

HAMILTON

Jim Buchanan reported that the 30th year for the Hamilton Chapter had been very successful. Membership numbers had improved. The program list of technical affairs was varied and well received. In Research Promotion, the goal was exceeded by 16% to a new high of \$6,381.00.

LONDON

Charles Clemance reported that London Chapter collapsed from exhaustion after hosting the CRC last year. They are hoping for renewed interest this coming year. The Chapter cooperated with the London District Construction Association in a one day trade show and will do so again in February 1990.

WINDSOR

Bill Colborne reported that the major thrust of the B.ofG. was to maintain quality programs, mini-seminars and table top displays at the monthly meetings. Judging of the Science Fair at the secondary school level was the new undertaking this year. The resignation of the Chapter President in mid year was a major set back. The Research Promotion campaign was a great success with a total of \$3,365.00 collected which exceeded our goal of \$2,300.00

SECOND BUSINESS SESSION

Chairman Johnson opened the second business session at 1:30 p.m. It was located in Salons B & C, Hotel Beausejour, Moncton, New Brunswick.

DIRECTOR AT LARGE

Chairman Johnson introduced Jules Olsen, DAL, and member of the Toronto Chapter. Mr. Olsen gave an outline of the duties of a DAL.

HEADQUARTERS' STAFFER

REGIONAL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

GENERAL:

1988-89 was what I would consider a very active year, with several accomplishments. Firstly, we had a bumper year with research promotion hitting an all time high. We will hear more later from the Vice Chairman.

We finally received an answer from Morton Slone and the Montreal Chapter as to the whereabouts and the use of the Chapter donations, for the review of the Refrigeration Engineers Code. I was a late entry onto the scene, so I am not too familiar with the whole program.

We also put to bed the case of the Halifax loan from Society, **t**o cover their short fall in their last C.R.C., Four Hundred Dollars was received from the London Chapter, a portion of their excess Revenue from their last years C.R.C.; a second Four Hundred from Ottawa that we will receive this year. That too, was from their C.R.C. The Plan satisfies Controller Walter Glasser as well as Halifax.

CHAPTERS:

We still have a problem with most Chapters communicating and co-operating. Specifically, to request for names for Committee work at Society Level. Not only do I not receive names, but I don't receive acknowledgements to my letters.

I also asked for input to the article highlighting Region II. Tony Giometta requested I prepare an article; and in turn I requested input from each Chapter. Only one Chapter replied without a follow up call from me; and even with a reminder I only received data from three Chapters.

Trying to get the Chapters questionnaire completed and in, is next to impossible. All are still not in! Why? How can Headquarters direct the C.R.C. packages to the delegates when they don't know who they are? It is also surprising and discouraging to know how many Chapters do not have an active C.R.C. Action Committee. We have one Chapter that's not going to make it, and I will be recommending their charter be forfeited. The minimum interest and desire is not there by the assigned members.

REGIONAL:

We have completed the first year with a Fall C.R.C. and I certainly believe the move was positive.

SOCIETY:

I must praise all Chapters that reviewed their Charters and Bylaws and returned them to Headquarters without delay.

SUMMARY:

I too, have completed my first full year as your Regional Chairman. Although I have experienced some frustration and realize that there is certainly more time and Fiscal expenditures than I had ever anticipated. I had not held any other Regional Office, and had not attended a C.R.C. since 1981 when I was a delegate and I had not experienced much Society Committee work. I was in awe and had my eyes opened with the first Board Meeting I attended as a Director. There is also considerable secretarial assistance required as well as telephone, and fax usage.

However, with all the surprises, I still enjoy the challenges of working with the Chapters in our Region as well as a member of Regions Council and the Board of Directors.

There is no better way of getting the insight of how our Society operates and the rewards that go with leading and building the Region. I would highly recommend you to consider expanding your horizons and become a part of your Region and Society, "The Greatest Technical Society In The World."

GUIDELINES FOR MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS

Motions and resolutions coming out of Chapters Regional Conference (CRC) can be most effective if presented in proper form. Often, a fine conceptual resolution is lost in the legislative process at Society level for want of proper wording, background, explanation, or research. The purpose of this document is to furnish suggestions for proper development of motions, and to funnel the motion into the correct comnittee.

First, it is important to understand the legislative process at Society level. Motions coming from CRC are first directed to the committee whose functions deal with the subject matter of the motion. The opinions of the appropriate committee are then passed to the Regions Council, acted upon by the Regions Council if appropriate, and then redirected to appropriate councils, standing committees or to the Board of Directors for final action. In the case of matters effecting the Presidential Award of Excellence, the Regions Council directs these to the Board of Directors for final action. In the case of matters effecting the Presidential Award of Excellence, the Regions Council directs these to the Presidentelect since the award criterion are the responsibility of the President-elect. Matters of interpretation or allocation are directed to appropriate staff members. The CRC Action Committee chairman should take guidance from the Regional Chairman or Vice-Chairmen as to the appropriate direction or authority for the requested action.

- A. Motion Format: The motion should be written in concise, succinct language ("whereases" and "legaleze" do not enhance the understandability or acceptability of motions). The body of the motion should contain as completely as possible the following information:
 - State completely the action which is being recommended or requested.
 - Example: Move that student dues be lowered...
 - Qualify wherever possible elements of the motion so that they are not open ended or open for interpretation, debate, or floor negotiation.
 - Example: Move that student dues be lowered to \$5 per year...
 - Include wherever appropriate the time frame for the execution of your request.
 - Example: Move that student dues be lowered to \$5 per year effective July 1, 1982.
- B. Required Background Information: As a separate statement provide historical background, progression of events, related

incidents, and other general information which would be helpful for the body to appropriately debate and decide on the issue. The more thorough the background, the more convincing the arguments, the more complete the research, and the more beneficial the request is to the betterment of the Society, the more likely the matter will be dealt with favorably. The CRC should be aware that matters involving fiscal impact must be cleared through the finance committee as a part of the process. Any research and information provided as background will simplify and minimize delays due to fiscal impact study.

In Summary, a good motion spells out who, what, when, how much, and then explains why it is a good and timely action.

C. Basic Functions of Committees: (Committee Chairmen Report to Councils)

Membership Promotion: Maintain and improve ASHRAE membership in all categories.

Energy and Technical Affairs: Help develop energy management activities at the chapter level, promote the Energy Award Competition program, develop an awareness of energy conservation and chapter seminars.

Research Promotion: Help finance the research activities approved by the Technology Council and the Board of Directors. Education and Chapter Programs: Promote educational activities at the chapter level, Student Branch Program, and chapter monthly programs.

Refrigeration ("R" in ASHRAE): Promote interests and activities of refrigeration.

D. Basic Functions of Councils:

Technology Council: Responsible for research project selection, approval and generation of standards, research promotion activities, technical committees.

Member Council: Responsible for Admissions and Advancements, Charter and Bylaws, International Activities, Honors and Awards, Meeting and Expositions, Membership Promotion.

Education Council: Responsible for Education and Chapter Programs, Energy and Technical Affairs, Government Affairs, ABET, Professional Development, and Society Programs. Publishing Council: Responsible for ASHRAE Journal and all other ASHRAE publications and historical activities. Regions Council: Composed of Regional Chairmen, Tresurer and President-elect - responsible for matters affecting general chapter operations.

The importance of research contributions to the Society's development of technology is emphasized. Individual chapter norms will be based on \$35 per member; however, a new category awards bonus points for chapters achieving contributions in excess of \$40 per chapter assigned member. The new category (second group in the formula) will award 10 points for each one dollar per assigned member in excess of \$40. No points will be deducted if \$40 per assigned member is not achieved. Research investments by large contributions of \$1,000 or more are recognized in a bonus category. There are also bonus points for the total dollars exceeding the maximum contribution from the last five years.

The formula for Research Promotion is as follows:
